## <u>Service Initiatives</u> Room Service is here!


Thank you for all of your suggestions to improve this process. We are getting better with each meal delivery. I know we have had some bumps in the implementation process which is to be expected with such a significant operational change. Kudos to everyone supporting this effort making this transition smooth! Please keep your ideas coming to

help us fine tune this new process. We are hearing that the patients are really enjoying the variety and taste of the food and we are confident that this change will improve our patients' experience. Although this process impacts nursing workflow including timing of patient medications and is more complex for managing our diabetic patients, remember it is not about what is easy for the providers of care, it is about delivering Patient Centered Care focused around what is best in the eyes of the patient. I know we can adjust because change is constant in our profession and we as nurses have mastered many changes! FAQ documents can be found on your units and with your department leaders, to help with communication around standardizing our messaging and processes.

## **Quality Initiatives**

Meditech 6.15 is here! Our downtime starts on 4/30/17 at midnight. The hospital will be setting up an Incident Command Center for at least one week and we will have clinical nurse super users available to support nursing on all shifts for 2 weeks. This upgrade is a significant improvement of our system and adds the following functionality enhancements:

- Critical Care Flowsheet with widgets that flag new orders and tasks
- Philips Monitor Interface with Meditech (vital signs)
- IV Infusions/Titrations in MAR with cumulative intakes
- Manage Transfer flag visible in Current Orders

### **People Initiatives**

- o The new electronic RN evaluation template is complete and implementation with new process beginning May 1, 2017. The evaluation process has been streamlined to focus on STAR (Support, Teamwork, Accountability and Respect) behaviors, job performance and goals.
- o Hospital and Nurses' Week is around the corner! The nominating team has selected the Nurse and Employee of the Year! Please plan to join us for the Hospital BBQ on May 10, 2017 to hear the announcement of these super stars! We also have lots of exciting activities over the time period of 5/8 5/12. More communication will be sent out regarding the activities. The following week on 5/17, we have scheduled three sessions with a national speaker, Rich Bluni, RN who has written books that inspire nurses and other healthcare providers on compassionate care. His talk will be on "Inspired Care." If you are off this day, I highly encourage you to attend and bring your colleagues. His energy and inspiration is powerful!
- o There has been a lot of discussion around standardizing nurses' uniforms. The unit based councils will continue to have communication with everyone and gather additional information and feedback prior to moving forward with this initiative.

### **Growth Initiatives**

- o The first half of the ICU refresh is complete and the second half is underway.
- o The OB doors begin construction 5/2/2017 and there will be no elective C-Sections cases scheduled for one week in L/D. C-Sections will be performed in the Main OR during this time period. Beginning May 9, we will be offering Trial of Labor to previous C-Section patients. This is an exciting opportunity for patients who previously were not given an option to attempt a vaginal birth here at SVMH and this option is still not available at CHOMP. The Perinatal staff and Periop staff have gone through equipment and room redesign and emergency drills to help us prepare for an expedited smooth emergency response if necessary.





## Congratulations to Divina Cortez, CNA/Ortho-Neuro-Spine!




A special presentation took place March 23rd as Divina Cortez, a nurse aide in Ortho Neuro Spine unit received the March STAR Award.

# Personal Story of Organ Donation Shared at SVMHS

On Friday, April 21st the staff at Salinas Valley Memorial got a very personal reminder of how organ donation helps save lives. To mark National Blue and Green Day, which is a day designated to spread awareness about organ, eye and tissue donation and transplantation, Jess and Theresa Chairez visited the Hospital's cafeteria for a celebration. Mr. Chairez shared his personal story of heart break and the gift of life.

It was Thanksgiving Day of the year 2000 and Chairez and his wife were waiting for their son Joseph to get off work so they could enjoy Thanksgiving dinner together. Joseph was 24 years old and a



police officer in Sacramento. He was a rookie cop, only 5½ months in the job. Later that day, the phone rang. Theresa answered and seconds later she yelled, "No! Not Joe!" The police chief had called to tell them their son had collapsed and had been taken to the hospital.

At the UC Davis Medical Center, physicians told Jess and Theresa their son Joseph had suffered a brain aneurysm. The gut wrenching news came later, when physicians confirmed their son would not recuperate.

Mr. Chairez says after hearing the devastating news, he prayed, asking God for help. He says it was in those moments that God spoke to him telling him he needed to donate his son's organs. Chairez says he had once told Joseph he did not want him to register as an organ donor, but at that moment in his son's hospital room he knew that was the right thing to do.

He says that it is what his son would have wanted. Moments later, when a physician asked him if he would be willing to donate Joseph's organs without hesitation he answered "Yes."

After making that decision, Chairez put his head to Joseph's chest and listed to his beating heart. Soon after, Joseph died. Approximately five years later, Chairez and his wife met the man who has their son's heart.

When they met, they got to put their heads to his chest, and once again listen to their son's beating heart.

Joseph's heart, lungs, kidneys, liver, pancreas and intestines were donated to four people. The Chairez' have met two of those individuals.

Seventeen years after Joseph's sudden death, they continue to take comfort in the gift of life Joe gave others. Chairez says that when his son passed away, "God gave him a second chance at life." Now, he dedicates his life to volunteering, to making quilts for the families of fallen police officers, and most importantly traveling throughout the country sharing his son's story and the importance of organ donation.

Jess and Theresa Chairez thanked the hospital for their commitment in joining in that education effort. Salinas Valley Memorial Healthcare System has long supported education around organ donation and has achieved Platinum Level with Donor Network West for its community outreach efforts.

## Four People Received the Gift of Life

- A 64 year-old father of five from California received a new heart. He is recovering and doing well.
- A 67 year-old male from northern California received a new pair of lungs. He is recovering and doing well.
- A 55 year-old female from southern California received a new right kidney. She is recovering and doing well.
- A 36 year-old male from northern California received a new pancreas and left kidney. He waited nine months for his lifesaving transplant. He is recovering and doing well.

He was also able to donate bones and veins.

# SVMHS Participates in "Every 15 Minutes" Education Program

Salinas Valley Memorial Healthcare System (SVMHS) participated in the Marina Police Department's Every 15 Minutes education effort. The program's goal is to educate high school students about the dangers of drinking and driving. On Tuesday, Marina High School students watched a locally produced video depicting a drunk driving crash, victims going to the ER and the deadly consequences of driving drunk.



The program name is based on the estimate that every 15 minutes someone in the United States is injured or killed in an alcohol related crash. The Marina Police Department hopes the video will deter students from drinking and driving.

"Our goal is to educate students about making responsible choices," says Marina Police Detective Pablo Andrade, who is overseeing the Every 15 Minutes Project. "We're grateful to Salinas Valley Memorial for partnering with us on this important project."

A crash scene was set up at Marina High School and in addition to the emergency room activity and grieving relatives, the video includes a mock funeral and a court scene where a judge sentences the student who caused the accident, to prison.

A portion of the Every 15 Minutes video was shot in the emergency room at Salinas Valley Memorial Hospital. Emergency Room staff participated in a simulation where a teenage girl is brought to the ER suffering life threatening injuries after being involved in a car crash caused by a drunk driver. The young victim succumbs to her injuries and the girl's grandmother has the difficult task of identifying the body.

"Every 15 Minutes is a powerful program and we are proud to partner with Marina Police to make it as impactful as possible," says Carla Spencer, RN, Nursing Director Emergency Services. "One of our ER physicians and several registered nurses participated in the scenario. We were at the rally to watch student's reaction to the video and I believe the message will help save lives."
